[Universal Declaration of Human Rights](#)

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) is a milestone document in the history of human rights. Drafted by representatives with different legal and cultural backgrounds from all regions of the world, the Declaration was proclaimed by the United Nations General Assembly in Paris on 10 December 1948 (General Assembly resolution 217 A) as a common standard of achievements for all peoples and all nations.

The UN Digital Library (UNDL) is a one-stop platform for researchers interested in accessing UN information current and historical. It offers easy access to documents, maps, speeches and voting data, as well as open access publications.

[Yearbook of the United Nations](#)

The authoritative reference work on the activities and concerns of the Organization. It includes the texts of all major General Assembly, Security Council and Economic and Social Council resolutions and decisions, from 1946 onwards.

[Basic Facts about the United Nations](#)

Published since 1947, Basic Facts serves as a trusted guide to the United Nations and its system of related agencies. Provides a concise overview of the Organization's work including current peacekeeping and peacebuilding missions, together with information about UN membership and structure. Published by the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs since 1961, the UN Handbook is a valuable reference guide that helps everyone working with or within the United Nations navigate the UN system effectively.
